#### Vivat Jesus! Dave Heilman, Grand Knight

Saint Stanislaus of Kraków Bishop and Martyr 1030-1079 April 11



Of noble birth, Stanislaus

studied at Gniezno, Poland, and probably at Paris. While serving as pastor and preacher at Kraków, he was elected—after Pope Alexander II nominated him—Bishop of Kraków in 1072.

During that time Poland was in a state of political unrest, with active opposition to King Boleslaw II the Bold.

Boleslaus for a while made a show of a better life. Soon, however, he returned to the most scandalous excesses, and the bishop, finding all remonstrance useless, pronounced the sentence of excommunication.

In defiance of the censure, on April 11, 1079, the king went to a chapel where Saint Stanislaus was saying Mass and commanded three groups of soldiers in succession to slay him at the altar. Each in turn came out, saying he had been alarmed by a light from heaven. At this the king himself rushed in and slew with his own hand the Saint at the altar during the Holy Sacrifice.

Following the execution of Stanislaus, King Bolesław was forced to flee to Hungary.

Miracles and legends spread the cult of the martyred bishop to Lithuania, Belorussia, and Ukraine, and Stanislaus became the patron saint of his native Poland.

He was canonized in 1253 by Pope Innocent IV and was the first Polish person to be honored with sainthood. Wawel Cathedral, which holds the saint's relics, is a principal national shrine.

## Pope Consecrates Russia and Ukraine to Our Lady



WASHINGTON (CNS) — Bishops in the U.S. took part in Pope Francis' invitation to join him in a moment of prayer, consecrating Russia and Ukraine to the **Immaculate Heart of Mary** March 25, entrusting the people of both countries to the care and protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

"Friends, we are all deeply disturbed by the war in Ukraine, and the unconscionable attacks on innocent men, women, and children in their homes and neighborhoods," said Los Angeles Archbishop José H. Gomez, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, in a video message.

"In this time when our world is weighed down under the shadow of war, I invite you to enter into this solemn moment of prayer with the Holy Father," the archbishop said. "Together with him, let us ask our Blessed Mother to turn her eyes of mercy toward all her children. Let us ask her to intercede with her son, to deliver her children from evil and grant us peace."

The Archdiocese of Los Angeles suggested that parishes ring their bells "29 times to mark the 29 days since the invasion of Ukraine began on Feb. 24, 2022." The March 25 prayer of consecration took place on the feast of the Annunciation of the Lord, when tradition says, the Angel Gabriel visited Mary to tell her she would be the mother of Christ.

Cardinal Wilton D. Gregory of Washington during a homily at the Basilica of the National Shrine said: "We come together today in one of the darker moments in

human history. We can literally see the war being conducted via our smartphones," he said, watching the path of rockets resulting in the death of defenseless children and the elderly and worrying about the threat of nuclear war.

He praised Pope Francis for his efforts, including for directly walking into the Russian Embassy to the Holy See to express his concern a day after the attacks against Ukraine began Feb. 24.
