Boniface, born in Crediton in Anglo-Saxon

England, Boniface, known as the apostle of the Germans, was an English Benedictine monk who gave up being elected abbot to devote his life to the conversion of the Germanic tribes. Two characteristics stand out: his Christian orthodoxy and his fidelity to the pope of Rome.

His first missionary journey occurred in 719 at the request of

Pope Gregory II. Paganism was a way of life. What Christianity he did find had either lapsed into paganism or was mixed with error. It was on this trip, around the time of Winter Solstice, that he was said to have come across a group of pagans worshipping an old oak tree. Horrified by what he saw as blasphemy, the all-action St Boniface grabbed the nearest axe and hacked down the tree.

These are the conditions that Boniface was to report in 722 on his first return visit to Rome. The Holy Father instructed him to reform the German Church. Boniface later admitted that his work would have been unsuccessful, from a human viewpoint, without a letter of safe-conduct from Charles Martel, the powerful Frankish ruler, grandfather of Charlemagne. Boniface was finally made a regional bishop and authorized to organize the whole German Church. He was eminently successful.

In the Frankish kingdom, he met great problems because of lay interference in bishops' elections, the worldliness of the clergy and lack of papal control. During a final mission to the Frisians, Boniface and 53 companions were massacred while he was preparing converts for confirmation.

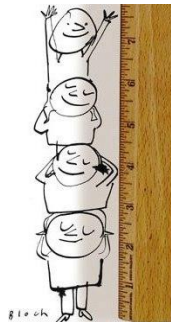
In order to restore the Germanic Church to its fidelity to Rome and to convert the pagans, Boniface had been guided by two principles. The first was to restore the obedience of the clergy to their bishops in union with the pope of Rome. The second was the establishment of many houses of prayer which took the form of Benedictine monasteries. A great number of Anglo-Saxon monks and nuns followed him to the continent, where he introduced the Benedictine nuns to the active apostolate of education.

Organizer, educator, and reformer, Boniface profoundly influenced the course of intellectual, political, and ecclesiastical history in Germany

and France throughout the Middle Ages. He unified the missionary movement by bringing it under the control of Rome.

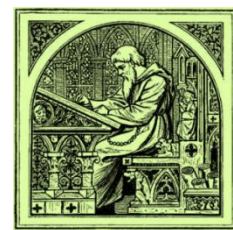

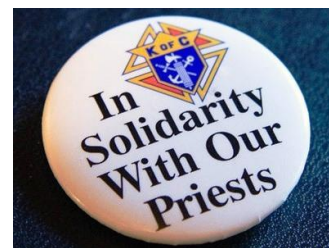

Mt Carmel Hospital Columbus, Ohio



Mt. Carmel Hospital was begun by **Dr. William Ballard Hawkes**. He donated the lot and provided initial financing. It was originally known as **Hawkes Hospital of Mt. Carmel**.

Before the building was completed Dr. Hawkes died in 1883, and **Dr. John Waterman Hamilton** (1823-1898) completed the work. The hospital was located on West Street and Davis Avenue in Franklinton.

Dr. Hamilton secured the services of the **Sisters of the Holy Cross**, led by **Mother Mary Angela Gillespie, CSC** to take over the hospital. Mother Angela and one sister (Sister Mary Rupina Dunn) opened the Hospital on July 5, 1886. It was formally dedicated on **July 16, 1886** on the feast of **Our Lady of Mt. Carmel** by the Diocesan Vicar General, Msgr. Francis X. Specht.

The first addition to the hospital was made in 1891. At that time the building was enlarged to make room for more patients. The corner-stone for this building was blessed by Bishop Watterson on May 31, 1891.

The Training School for Nurses was opened on September 15, 1903. The first graduates received their diplomas in 1906. Eight Holy Cross Sisters were included in this class.

In 1906 a second building adjoining the old one was started and it included a chapel and 120 additional private rooms for patients.

Another building, consisting of 120 rooms, with recreation halls, library and three

classrooms, was erected, and opened on February 2, 1921. This was the home for the student nurses.

In 1934, there were 114 nurses and 26 Sisters on the service roll of the hospital. It was equipped to take care of 239 patients.

The hospital was one of the first to meet the requirements of the American College of Surgeons in 1919.

Pope Francis To Lead Rosary for Peace in Ukraine



Pope Francis will lead a Rosary for peace as a sign of hope for those suffering from the ongoing war in Ukraine and wars around the world. The news was announced in a statement: "At the conclusion of the Marian month, Pope Francis wishes to offer a sign of hope to the world, suffering from the conflict in Ukraine and deeply wounded by the violence of the many wars still active."

On Tuesday, 31 May, at 6pm, the Pope will pray the Rosary before the statue of *Mary Regina Pacis* in Rome's Marian Basilica.

"All the faithful in every part of the world are invited to support Pope Francis in his prayer to the Queen of Peace," the statement encouraged.
